What: Voces de Cambio, (Voices of Change), Center for Domestic Peace (C4DP's) volunteer group of domestic violence survivors, was awarded **California Partnership to End Domestic Violence's Equity Award** on November 2nd at their statewide virtual conference.

Who: Voces de Cambio (Voces) is a community-based volunteer group comprised of 19 former C4DP service users and survivors of domestic violence who are active in outreach, education, and organizing within the Spanish-speaking community and to other underserved and underrepresented communities in Marin and beyond.

Voces is predominately comprised of immigrant women, several of whom are monolingual, raising children (many as single parents), and working multiple jobs.

Why: For the past 18 years, this amazing group of community volunteers has achieved breathtaking results, reaching thousands of individuals through a variety of campaigns and activities. C4DP's success in reaching isolated Spanish-speaking women is due in large part to the efforts of Voces.

This group purposefully expanding their activism to reach more people impacted by domestic violence in new and diverse way. They do this through reaching out to marginalized groups such as members of the LGBTQ in the Latino community. Voces opens the door for Latinos to seek help in situations of domestic violence causing an increase in Latina victims assisted through C4DP's advocacy efforts. They inspire community activism to end domestic violence.

Most recently, they launched their largest effort this October "Tu Voz, Mi Voz" (Your Voice, My Voice). Using the power of social media and the C4DP website, they produced and posted videos with one essential piece of domestic violence information each day in October, recorded in both Spanish and English. In their plan, they took special notice to make these accessible for the hard of hearing, the visually impaired, and the literacy challenged so all survivors can find help, hope, and healing from domestic violence.
